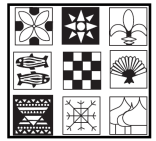

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Old Time Finn Hall @ Swedish Cultural Center

Saturday, October 9, the Swedish Cultural Center in Seattle will be transported into an old word tradition, the Finn Hall! From the late 19th century well into the 20th century, almost every Finnish-American community had at least one hall—a center for social, entertainment and educational activities. These halls were the cultural hearts of the communities. For a recent immigrant struggling with difficulties, there was always familiarity and plenty to do “down at the hall”—concerts, athletics, plays, talks and especially, music and dance.

In keeping with the traditional Finn Hall experience, the evening will begin with **Arnold Alanen**, Fulbright Fellow and Professor Emeritus from

University of Wisconsin, with an interesting talk highlighting Finnish immigrants stories and how they brought their understanding of wilderness, clearings, farmsteads and cultural resource preservation to America. He will also address the question: Did the sauna change when it crossed the Atlantic?

The evening continues at 8:00 pm with a concert from the Minneapolis-based band, aptly named **Finn Hall**. The Minneapolis based group, will give a short informative concert highlighting some special instruments and styles of music, followed by a dance with traditional spirited Finnish and Swedish tunes. The band has traveled and performed throughout the United States and Finland.

Although Finn Hall plays old-time tunes, the group is a contemporary band and is part of an on-going living tradition. Recently, the Finn Hall band was given the honor of the National Finlandia Foundation Musicians of the Year.

COLORS OF THE TURKISH CULTURE: Red and white (colors of the flag), as well as turquoise (color of the Mediterranean Sea), are symbolic colors. **MOST POPULAR FOODS:** Doner and shish kabob, borek, vegetable dishes cooked in olive oil, mezes, baklava and yogurt constitute an integral part of Turkish cuisine. **GREATEST SOURCE OF CULTURAL PRIDE:** Traditions of food, music, and dance spanning the thousand-year-old Anatolian heritage, influenced by the rapid transition from a 600-year old sultanate (the Ottoman Empire) to democracy and the immediate implementation of major reforms initiated by an exceptional leader, M. K. Atatürk, are a great

source of cultural pride. **LIVELIHOOD:** In addition to its vast natural resources (fishing and mining), growing industry sector (textiles), imports and exports, and international business ventures that enhance the livelihood of Turks, the country's hospitality sector is well developed as it attracts many tourists each year.

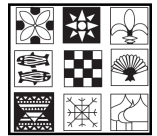

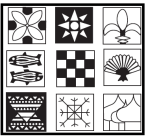

CROATIA

Dalmatian Brodet

2½ lbs of fresh mixed seafood: Sole, Snapper, Tuna, Monkfish, Mussels, Squid, etc.

4 Tbsp of Extra Virgin Olive Oil

3 Cloves of fresh Garlic

2 Tbsp of Red pepper flakes

1 Yellow Onion

1 Bunch of Flat Leaf Parsley

2 Tomatoes, sliced

1 Tbsp of Tomato Paste

1 Tbsp of Vinegar

Preheat Olive Oil in a large dutch oven. Add the onions, sautéing for one minute before adding the red pepper flakes, garlic and tomato paste. While the vegetables are cooking, chop each of the fish into squares, approximately 1 - 2 inches. Add the denser, thicker fish first to the vegetables and gradually stack the more delicate ones on top (especially squid and shellfish). Add the tomatoes, vinegar, fresh parsley, salt and pepper and bring to a boil. Minimize stirring as much as possible. Cook on a very low heat for 1 hour. Serve immediately on top of polenta, risotto or pasta.

Warm Brie & Dalmatian Fig Spread

Large wedge of Brie (preferable a double cream brie)

1/4 cup Dalmatian Fig or Dalmatia Fig and Orange Spread.

Your favorite Warm Bread (peasant bread, artisan bread or an Italian loaf - crusty on the outside, but soft on the inside)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Place brie in a casserole dish and top with fig spread. Bake about 15 minutes or until the Brie starts to bubble and ooze. Serve warm with your favorite warm bread.



TURKEY

Turkish Delight

2 c Sugar

2 Tbls Cornstarch

1 c Water

1/2 tsp Cream of tartar

1 Tbls Flavoring *

Food coloring **

1/2 c Roasted nuts, chopped ***

Confectioners' sugar

* Flavorings: rose, mastic, strawberry, orange or lemon.

** Food coloring: red, yellow, green or orange (depending on flavoring used)

*** Nuts: almonds or pistachios

Dissolve sugar and cornstarch in water. Add cream of tartar. Boil to 220 degrees F. Cover pot the last 5 minutes. Add flavor and food color. Add nuts. Pour into oiled shallow pan. When cool, cut into squares and roll each piece in sifted powdered sugar. Store in plastic bag.

Turkish Coffee

3/4 c Water

1 Tbls Sugar

1 Tbls Pulverized Coffee

1 Cardamon Pod

Combine water and sugar in an ibrik or small saucepan. Bring to a boil; then remove from heat and add coffee and cardamon. Stir well and return to heat. When coffee foams up, remove from heat and let grounds settle. Repeat twice more. Pour into cups; let grounds settle before drinking.

INDIA

Bhagari Jhinga - Prawns in Tomato Cream Sauce - India

Sauce

1 Tbls tomato puree

3/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp sugar

1 tsp Garam Masala

1/2 tsp ground roasted cumin seeds

1/4 tsp chili powder, or to taste

3 Tbls coriander leaves, finely chopped

1 fresh green chili pepper, finely chopped

1 Tbls lemon juice

1 7 oz can coconut milk, well stirred, or cream

Stir-Frying Prawns

3 Tbls vegetable oil

1 tpx black mustard seeds

3 cloves garlic, finely chopped

15 fresh curry leaves

1 1/4 lbs medium-sized uncooked prawns, peeled and deveined

To make sauce put tomato puree in bowl. Add salt, sugar, garam masala, ground roasted cumin seeds, chili powder, coriander leaves, green chili, lemon juice and 1 tablespoons water; mix well. Slowly add coconut milk or cream, mix. Set aside. To stir-fry prawns put oil in wok and set over med-high to high heat. When hot, add mustard seeds. As soon as a seed pops, add garlic and curry leaves. Sir until garlic turns medium brown and put in prawns. Stir until prawns turn opaque most of the way though and put in sauce. Turn heat to medium and just heat sauce through until it begins to simmer. By then prawns should be cooked through. Turn of heat. Serve with rice.

MEXICO

Chorizo Bread

5 1/2 oz Chorizo

3 c Flour (not self-rising)

3 Tbls Grated parmesan cheese

2 Tbls Brown sugar-packed

4 1/2 tsp Baking powder

1 tsp Fennel or caraway seeds

1/2 tsp Salt

1/4 tsp Baking soda

1 3 oz. cream cheese softened

1 8 oz. cream cheese softened

1 c Milk

2 Eggs

1/4 c Butter or Margarine, melted

If necessary, remove sausage casing. Coarsely chop sausage; you should have 1 cup. Set aside. In a bowl, combine flour, Parmesan cheese, sugar, baking powder, fennel seeds, salt, and baking soda. In another bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth; then stir in milk. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating well. Stir in butter and chorizo. Add to flour mixture, stirring just to moisten. Spoon batter into a greased 5 x 9 inch loaf pan. Bake in 375 F. oven until bread browns and begins to pull away from pan sides (Approx. 55 min.). Let cool in pan on rack for 5 min, then turn out. Cut bread into thick slices and serve warm. Store at room temp. for 1 day. Freeze for longer storage.

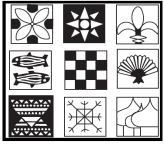

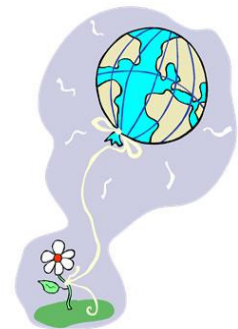
