## “From Hiroshima To Hope”

*“From Hiroshima To Hope”  
Lantern Floating Peace Ceremony At  
Green Lake, Saturday August 6*

*Hiroshima to Hope*, Seattle’s annual peace event honoring the victims of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and all victims of war and violence, takes place from 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Saturday, August 6 at Green Lake, just south of the Seattle Public Theater. This year’s commemoration marks the 66th anniversary of the bombings, and the **26<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the From Hiroshima to Hope** event in Seattle.

The Seattle event, which concludes with the floating of the lanterns on the lake at dusk, has grown to be one of the largest commemorations held anywhere outside of Japan. More than 1,000 attendees are expected again this year. This year’s keynote speaker is Trevor McMorris Tate, current president of the Greater Seattle Chapter of the United Nations Association, and

faculty member of the International Studies Program at Bellevue College.

Pre-event activities begin at 6:00 p.m. and include lantern calligraphy, folding of peace cranes, music, and a Meditation Space sponsored by the Buddhist Peace Fellowship. The family program begins at 7 p.m. with a blessing by Pat John (*Ahousat First Nations*) and includes musical performances by Seattle Kokon Taiko, a Japanese-American taiko drum performance group, and Peter Hill, Grand Master of the *shakuhachi*, the traditional Japanese bamboo flute. In addition to Tate’s keynote, Travis Charles (*Haida, Tlingit, Aleut, Zuni*) and Ensemble, Red Eagle Soaring Native Youth Theatre, will perform a story from the youth play, “The Right to Justice,” dedicated to the memory and families of John T. Williams and Chief Leschi. The

## Norwegian Folk Dance & Dinner

Project Tove is an exciting group from the provinces of Oppland, Hedmark, Buskerud, Akershus, and Mre og Romsdal specially created for this year’s tour of the Pacific Northwest. Ingrid Maurstad Tuko,

who leads the group, is a member of the board for *Noregs Ungdomslag* and *Leiar i Folkedansret / Leader of the Council of Traditional Dance*. Ingrid has taught with Nils Slapgrd at *Norsk Folkedans Stemne* several times before with the group *Folkedanslaget Slja*. She is bringing eleven young people and seven adults who have a variety of talents: six *halling* dancers who will all attempt to kick the hat off the pole at end of the program. The fast paced *halling* is a powerful dance showing off the dancers ability to perform a number of gymnastic turns prior to kicking the hat. Musicians with the group play *torader* (a two row small accordion type instrument), *hardingfele* (a Norwegian fiddle with 4 strings and 4 or 5 sympathetic things below), and *flatfele* (a flat fiddle). They know

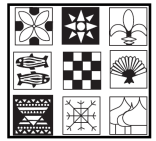

## Deception Pass State Park plays host to the American Roots Music Series



The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission Folk Arts in the Parks Program invites the public to the American Roots music series at Deception Pass State Park.

American Roots music series performances begin 7 p.m. Saturdays starting July 16 through Aug. 6 at Deception Pass State Park, 41020 State Route 20, Oak Harbor. Local artists will perform a variety American music styles in celebration of traditional folk music from the Pacific Northwest. The American Roots music series is free to the public. *The Discover Pass is not required for vehicle access to these performances.*

All performances take place in the West Beach amphitheater on the Whidbey Island side of the park, unless raining. If raining, performances will move to the East Cranberry Lake picnic shelter, also on the Whidbey Island side of the park.

Deception Pass State Park is a 4,134-acre marine and camping park with 77,000 feet of saltwater of shoreline, and 33,900 feet of freshwater shoreline on three lakes. The park is best known for views of Deception Pass and Bowman Bay, old-growth forests, abundant wildlife and the historic Deception Pass Bridge. The Bowman Bay area is accessible from Rosario Road, off State Route 20, by Pass Lake.

The American Roots music series is part of a broader series of events celebrating Washington's diverse cultures and presented by the Folk and Traditional Arts in the Parks Program. The program is a partnership between the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission, the Washington State Arts Commission and Northwest Heritage Resources with funding provided by National Endowment for the Arts and the Washington State Arts Commission program grants. The Commission manages a diverse system of more than 100 state parks and recreation programs, including long-distance trails, boating safety and winter recreation. The 98-year-old park system will celebrate its 100th anniversary in 2013.

Today, the need is greatest for foster parents for refugee teenagers and sib-

ling groups from the Congo, Burma, Bhutan, and Somalia. We also need homes for Latino youth who have fled abuse and abandonment in Central America and Mexico.

Foster parents receive a monthly stipend of about \$800 for each foster youth's expenses. The youth also receive full medical and dental coverage.

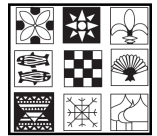

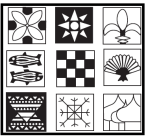

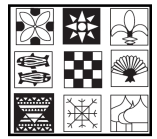

**Salmon with Brazilian Rub**

- 4 salmon fillets
- 1/2 large lemon - juice
- 1/2 large orange - juice
- salt and pepper
- 1 whole orange -zest
- 2 Tbls. brown sugar
- 1 Tbls. chili powder
- 1 large garlic clove -minced
- 2 Tbls. butter - melted

In a shallow dish large enough to hold the salmon, combine the juices, salt and pepper. Add the salmon, turning to coat with the marinade. Let marinate at room temperature for 20 minutes, turning the fillets once. Pre-heat the oven to 425F. Line a shallow baking pan with aluminum foil and grease with a little of the melted butter. In a small dish, combine the orange zest, brown sugar, chili powder and minced garlic. Rub the marinated salmon with the brown sugar mixture. Place in the pan and frizzle with the remaining melted butter. Bake for 8 to 12 minutes, depending on thickness of fillets. Be careful not to overcook.

**Mariscada - Brazilian Fish Stew**

- 12 Clams
- 1 lb Mussels
- 2 Tbls. Pure olive oil
- 1 Large onion, diced
- 2 Large ripe tomatoes, peeled, Seeded, coarsely chopped
- 2 Cloves garlic, minced
- 1 Sprig fresh cilantro, minced
- Salt & black pepper to taste
- Cayenne pepper to taste
- Pinch of saffron threads
- 4 lb. Fresh codfish fillets, cut into serving-size pieces
- 1 lb. Jb shrimp, peeled, deveined
- 1/2 lb. Fresh crabmeat, picked over for cartilage

Clean the clams by scrubbing them thoroughly with a wire brush, removing any beard or barnacles. Then place them in a large pot with 1 gallon of water or enough to cover, and 1/3 cup salt. Allow the clams to remain for 20 minutes during which time they will expel the sand inside. Continue this process, changing the water at least two more times. The mussels are cleaned in a similar manner, but you must leave them in the water for at least 2 hours. Throw away any clams or mussels that float

or are not tightly closed. Heat the olive oil in the bottom of a large, heavy saucepan over medium heat. Add onion, tomatoes, garlic, coriander, salt, peppers, and saffron and cook, stirring, until the onions have softened, but are not brown. Add the fish and shellfish to the onion mixture. Cover with water and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to low and simmer for 10 minutes, or until the shellfish open. Discard any clams or mussels that do not open. Serve hot.

**Empanadas - Brazilian Meat Pies**

- 4 cup Flour
- 1 Tbls. Butter
- 1 cup Shortening
- 2 Whole eggs
- 1 Egg yolk
- 2 tsp. Salt
- 1 1/2 cup Cold water for the filling:
- 1 Tbls. Oil
- 1 small Onion, finely chopped (about 1/4 cup)
- 1 Clove garlic, minced
- 3 Chicken legs
- 1 Bay leaf
- 2 Tbls. Tomato paste
- Salt & pepper
- Water, as needed
- 3 Tbls. Flour
- 1/4 c Cooked peas
- 8 Pitted green olives, chopped
- Cayenne pepper
- 1 Egg beaten with a pinch of salt for glaze

Servings: Makes 50 1/2-inch empanadas. Notes: Empanadas are Brazil's national appetizer, tiny pies filled with chicken, olives, and peas. Empanadas are traditionally made in special molds that are almost as deep as they are wide. If they are unavailable, any small tartlet molds will do.

To prepare the dough: Place the flour in a large mixing bowl and make a well in the center. Place the butter, shortening, eggs, salt, and 1 cup water in the well. Using one hand to mix, squeeze these ingredients through your fingers to make a paste. Gradually work in the flour, squeezing the dough between your fingers to mix it. Add water as necessary; the dough should be quite soft. Let the dough rest for 30 minutes while you prepare the filling.

Heat the oil in a large saucepan. Saute the onion and garlic over medium heat for 2 to 3 minutes or until soft but not brown. Add the chicken, bay leaf, to-

mato paste, salt, and pepper, plus water just to cover. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer for 20 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked. Skim off the fat that rises to the surface. Remove the chicken, then strain and reserve the broth. When the chicken is cool enough to handle, discard the skin and remove the meat from the bone. Finely shred the meat with your fingers or in a food processor. Stir in the flour, peas, and olives. Stir in 3 to 4 Tbsp broth; the filling should be moist but not runny. Add enough cayenne to give the chicken a little bite.

Pinch off cherry-sized pieces of dough and use them to line the tartlet molds. The dough should just reach over the top of the mold. Place a spoonful of filling in each crust. Roll out the remaining dough and cut out tops for the empanadas. Try to capture an air bubble when you place the top over the filling. Seal the tartlets by pinching together the top and bottom crust. Note: The empanadas can be prepared ahead to this stage and frozen.

Preheat the oven to 350-F. Brush the tops with egg glaze. Bake for 30 minutes or until golden brown. Unmold and serve.

**Papo de Anjo - Angel's Double Chin**

- 7 yolks
- 2 egg whites
- 1 Tbls. flour
- butter
- homemade Syrup
- 4 cups sugar
- 3 cups water
- 1 orange peel
- 2 Tbls. rum



Whip egg yolks until lemony colored. Add flour and continue whipping 1 minute. Whip whites until they form soft peaks. Fold white into yolks Butter 12 muffin tins and pour batter to half full tins. Place tins into a pan with water and bake at 350 until firm. Make a light syrup. Let it cool to warm. Poke holes in each little cake and drop them into the syrup. Let stand at least 6 hours before serving. Keep them in the syrup in a glass bowl.

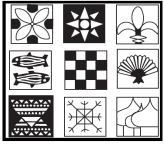
