EHC's **32nd Annual Awards Dinner**, was celebrated Friday, March **28**, 2014, at Nordic Heritage Museum, in Ballard.

In 2014 we honored 2 members of our local ethnic communities—leaders and role models who have given their time to their own community and the community at large.

Here are their stories...

The Gordon Ekvall Tracie
Award is given to an ethnic performing artist who has made significant contributions to the development and presentation of the traditional arts in our community. This year we honor Sidney Deering.

As artistic director of Radost Folk Ensemble, Sidney Deering has been committed to the preservation and performance of Balkan folklore for many years.

Sidney grew up surrounded by people from many cultures. When she joined Radost as a dancer in 1985, she found her lifelong avocation. She regards her most important work as fostering the folk tradition in children, organizing many Radost performances and artist residencies at schools, teaching dance workshops for children adopted from Eastern Europe, and establishing the children's program at Balkanalia! Folklore Camp each year. As a Washington State history teacher, Sidney goes beyond the textbook to help students appreciate the diverse communities of our state.

Sidney's greatest pleasure is connecting communities through folklore. For the past three years, Sidney has organized the Bulgari-



an Showcase concert at the Northwest Folklife Festival. By organizing the first Kukeri parade at Folklife, she helped the local Bulgarian community take that tradition back as their own. Sidney researched and brought to the stage the ancient Slavic rain-making ritual "peperuda" in two forms: a Macedonian version for Folklife and a Croatian version for CroatiaFest.

For Sidney, costumes are an important part of our ethnic heritage. As caretaker of the priceless Radost collection, she has lent Hungarian, Romanian, Bulgarian and Croatian costumes to other groups. When Sidney wears a costume for a performance, she honors the culture and connects us to the hands that wove or embroidered the cloth.

The Aspasia Phoutrides Pulakis Award is given annually to an individual who has contributed significantly to a Northwest ethnic community. This year we honor JoAnne Hardt Rudo.

With her German/Norwegian background, JoAnne Hardt Rudo has always been interested in world cultures. After college, she worked as an airline stewardess. Later she worked with Cold War refugees at NATO in Germany. JoAnne has traveled to over fifty countries, including East Berlin, the Balkan countries and the Middle East, exploring their cultures and traditions. She was in Tunisia a week after the Arab Spring.

She developed a housing project learning center at Highline Community College, teaching Adult Basic Education, GED preparation, and English as a second language at Seattle Central Community College. She helped to maintain ethnic backgrounds of local immigrants (one class

had seventeen different nationalities). A proud moment came when one of the long-suffering students from war-torn Cambodia led the Pledge of Allegiance at EHC's July 4th Naturalization Ceremony. JoAnne has been an active member of the Leif Erickson Lodge, Swedish Club, Finlandia Foundation (receiving the President's Award in 2012), Nordic Heritage Museum, and many others.

Her multi-ethnic family celebrates Christmas and Hanukkah, Easter and Passover, St. Patrick's Day and Octoberfest, the Independence days of America (July 4th) and Norway (May 17th).

Rudo works tirelessly to inspire in her family and community the joy of promoting and learning about the richness of the world's ethnic cultures. A few of the groups that have enjoyed Rudo's active participation are the Tanhuajat Finnish Folkdancers, Polania Polish Folk Dancers, Skandia Folkdance Society, Seattle Folklore Society.

JoAnne Hardt Rudo, this year's recipient of the Asphasia Phoulakis Award for enriching our ethnic community, is proof that the more you get involved with different cultures, the more enriched your life becomes!

All donations made through The Seattle Foundation's website on GiveBIG day will receive a percentage of the matching funds (or "stretch") pool. This percentage depends on the size of the stretch pool and how much is raised in total donations on GiveBIG day. For example, if the stretch pool is \$500,000 and the total amount raised that day is \$2,000,000, then the stretch percentage is 25% (or 25 cents on the dollar).

Do all donations qualify for GiveBIG "stretch" dollars? The Seattle Foundation will "stretch" all donations up to \$5,000 per donor, per organization. The reason they are limiting the amount that qualifies for "stretch" pool is to help these funds go further for organizations that rely on smaller donations.

Does it cost anything to participate There is no cost for nonprofits to participate in GiveBIG. However, online credit card donations for GiveBIG 2014 are subject to a 2.85% (special rate from Click & Pledge processing) per transaction processing fee by our online donations provider and credit card companies

for most credit cards. Some credit cards, usually rewards or business credit cards, carry an additional non-qualified fee of 1%. The Seattle Foundation does not receive a percentage of gifts for supporting and overseeing GiveBIG and does not receive any income from credit card transactions. The "stretch" amount will be determined based on the total donation amount, before the processing fee, and donors will receive a tax deduction on the full donation amount.

How does my organization receive online donations on GiveBIG day? The Seattle Foundation partners with Click & Pledge to process donations made through SF website.



Dracula is certainly among the best-known men in the world, yet arguably the least understood. While many stories have been told about both the real and the fictional Dracula, Foia's account benefits from his extensive research and the unique perspective of a Transylvanian native.

Over a period of four decades, Foia visited the castles, fortresses, dungeons, and underground chambers that witnessed the life of his protagonist Dracula. He interviewed historians in Romania and Turkey to capture new insights into the makeup of his elusive compatriot. In doing this, he aimed to gaze beyond Dracula's iconic image and try to ferret out the essence of the man behind the legend. Under Foia's pen, the "Dracula Chronicles" series finally pierces the veil of mystery that has shrouded the Wallachian king for over 500 years.

"Dracula was immoderate in everything except moderation," said Foia. "His wrath for evildoers knew no limits, and his passion for women was volcanic. Women shielded their men from his sword, while men shielded their women from his... looks. Regardless, once he had them in his sights, not many of either gender got away."

Book One of the series, "Son of the Dragon", provides the first ever origin story of the man whose fame has survived for over 500 years and has reached even the most remote places of the planet. It begins Dracula's epic journey that will see the young prince become, in future volumes, the famed strongman, warrior, and object of women's interest who has conquered the imagination of millions. Inquisitive, skilled arms, and often reck-



less, young Dracula seeks out danger to prove his readiness to be a man. An avid reader of history and lover of languages, Dracula uses his knowledge and wits to overcome impossible odds facing him. Then, in a single impulsive step he propels himself into a hostile world capable of devouring even the strongest men.

Book Two of the series, "Empire of the Crescent Moon", follows young Prince Vlad, a.k.a. Dracula, on his journey into the heart of the Ottoman Empire. Soon he comes to regret his rash decision to cross the Danube into the world

ruled with absolute power by Sultan Murad II of the House Osman. It is a world in which nothing is what it seems, and where mortal danger lurks around every corner. Away from his native land of Wallachia, where he could rely on his martial skills and friends, Dracula has now only his wit to sustain him. As things go from bad to worse, help comes to Dracula from a most unexpected quarter.

"Dracula was a consummate lover and a born heartbreaker," said Foia. "Built powerful, he had flowing black hair and gleaming white teeth. Both men and women found his green eyes beguiling, but obviously for different reasons."

About the Author: Victor T. Foia was born in Transylvania where he studied theoretical physics at the Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj. At the age of twenty-two Victor escaped from behind the Iron Curtain and defected to Italy. After a waiting period of months spent in UN refugee camps, he emigrated to the United States. There, Victor graduated from the Universities of Illinois and Dallas. He then embarked upon a career as a corporate executive, culminating in the position of President and CEO of an international corporation. Presently he is engaged full time in writing historical fiction.

Victor's interest in Dracula dates from the age of six, when he first visited his compatriot's birthplace, only a hundred miles from his own. Soon this interest became a lasting passion for research into Dracula's life.

Victor's journey has taken him to virtually all the places where Dracula lived, loved, fought, and was imprisoned. In the end, by the empty tomb from where the prince disappeared without a trace 535 years ago, Victor felt his journey of discovery was complete, and now the story of the *real* Dracula could be told.


