On Friday, July 4, 2014, the Ethnic Heritage Council will host the 30th Annual Naturalization Ceremony at Seattle Center, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Over 450 candidates, from more than 80 countries, will be sworn in by The Honorable Richard C. Tallman, U.S. Circuit Court Judge, as new citizens of the United States of Produced by the **Ethnic** America. Heritage Council, Seattle Center, United States District Court for the Western District of Washington and the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, this is by far one of the most meaningful and moving Fourth of July events in the region. While this is an especially important day for the many new citizens, coming from a variety of nations and cultures, it arouses great interest among friends and families as well as from the community at

'Through The Eyes of the Artist'

The Peninsula Art League and the City of Gig Harbor are pleased to host 'The Net Shed Art Project' on display from through June 15th at the Civic Center, located at 3510 Grandview Street, in Gig Harbor. The show is on display in the lobby and is available for viewing between 8am and 5pm Monday through Friday.

The show culminates from a yearlong Peninsula Art League program whereby local artists painted, photographed, and sketched one or more of the town's seventeen historic net sheds located along the waterfront in downtown Gig Harbor. Nearly twelve months after gathering and rendering their art, PAL members came together to share and show those efforts with this fifty-eight piece large. The Naturalization Ceremony also serves to reaffirm the deeper meaning of citizenship of the United States of America. The public is encouraged to attend the free event.

The ceremony will include speeches by U.S. Representative Jim McDermott, King County Executive Dow Constantine, with Seattle City Mayor Ed Murray as Master of Ceremonies.

Greenwood Concert Band will give a pre-ceremony performance beginning at 11:00am. The formal program begins at 12:00noon, commencing with the presentation of colors by the United States Army Color Guard, the singing of the United States National Anthem, and immediately followed by a perfor-

Are you new to hosting? Do you have an interest in China? Or do you want to offer a student a glimpse of daily life in Seattle and the warmth of a local home for a few days?

We invite you to host a student or teacher during this summer's Seattle Summer English Program! The China Weekend Homestay will take place from Friday evening, July 18 through Monday morning, July 21.

Hosts offer **3-night homestays** (Friday evening through Monday morning) for students ages 14-17 who are visiting Seattle for an intensive 2-week English program. Since students live in the residence halls on the UW campus for most of the program, the one-weekend homestay is an important way for them to engage with local life and culture.

Apply to host a Seattle Summer English Program student by filling out the <u>FIUTS host application</u>, and read on for more information. If you are already a FIUTS host, you do not need to fill out an application again - just contact <u>Ellen</u> to sign up to host.

Hosting Dates

Hosts will pick up their students on the University of Washington campus the evening of Friday, July 18 and drop them off the morning of Monday, July 21. If you are not able to pick up or drop off students, that's okay - we can

make alternative transportation arrangements if necessary.

About the Participants

High school participants are between 14-17 years old, both male and female, and speak at least intermediate English.

Adult participants are English teachers, school administrators, or chaperones who are accompanying students on the program.

Hosting Requirements

Students can share a room with a person of similar age and the same sex. Students should not sleep on the couch (air mattresses are fine). Hosts provide meals for their students when they are together.

Number of Students Per Household

Hosts are welcome (and encouraged!) to host more than one student. We have found that many hosts for this program prefer to host two students so that they can support one another during the homestay. If you'd like to host two students and need an extra sleeping space, FIUTS is able to loan hosts an air bed for the weekend.

Participant Schedule

The homestay weekend is an opportunity for students to visit a local family and see how they spend their time and how they live. We expect that you spend time with the students and get to know each other. However, this is not a tourism weekend, so hosts do not need to plan a big itinerary! Simple activities such as taking a walk around the neighborhood, baking cookies, going to the park or the grocery store, and visiting family are all great ways for students to participate in daily life in Seattle! If you are interested in taking your student sightseeing, FIUTS will provide information about what activities students are participating in during the program so hosts will not have to repeat anything students have already done.

About the Seattle Summer English Program

The Seattle Summer English Program brings middle and high school students from China to Seattle through Washington Cultural Exchange. The program takes place in July and includes two weeks of English language classes and fun and educational excursions. Throughout the program, students will be exposed to spoken English in daily use and will be challenged to practice English in many environments. They will share unique experiences around Seattle and have the opportunity to build friendships among and across cultures.

Host Events and Activities

Hosts will be invited to a final farewell dinner and graduation ceremony for students at the close of the program, as well as the annual Community Barbecue and International Welcome Night in September.

Skandia Midsommarfest - by Kathy Bruni



Step into the summer solstice traditions of Scandinavia with Skandia's Midsommarfest! This free festival on June 29 (11 a.m.-6 p.m.) is very traditional, with the raising of the majstång (Midsommar pole), costumed dancers and musicians, flower-crown making, Scandinavian food and crafts, and opportunities to join in the merrymaking. There is a children's area, with activities, story-telling, and other things to keep the younger set entertained, including their own Midsommar pole.

This day in the beautiful St. Edward State Park starts with music and dance performances, which continue until the pole-raising ceremony at 2:30 p.m. Costumed musicians and dancers process to the Midsommar pole, bringing with them the rings and garland to decorate the pole.

When the pole has been bedecked with flowers and greenery, the audience is encouraged to join in with shouts of encouragement as a group of strong men and women hoist the pole to its upright position, using a series of crossed beams to support it until it becomes vertical and is locked into place. Traditional sing-

ing dance games—fun for the whole family—follow the pole raising, and the audience is encouraged to join in.

After the pole is up, participatory dancing takes place on the main stage. Join the dancers for a shottis, hambo, polska, waltz or other Scandinavian dance.

Many local Scandinavian music and dance groups will showcase the intricate and colorful traditional tunes and dances of Sweden, Norway, Finland, and Denmark.

A costume presentation gives you chances to hear about the various costumes being worn, and the regions they are from, and to ask questions—a rare opportunity to see these authentic and intricate costumes up close.

In addition to the many opportunities for dance and music fun, you can peruse the Hemslöjdsmarknad—an ave-



nue of traditional crafts where carefully selected people crafts demonstrate their skills and sell their wares. Traditional Midsommar food and Scandinavian delicacies will be offered. You can also decorate a flower crown-the midsomclassic markrans - to add the finishing touch to your Midsommar celebration.

Annually, the Council produces several ethnic festivals, and a public naturalization ceremony on July 4th.
