Workshop Sessions

Your Organization's Records: What to Save and How to Organize Print and Digital Materials

Crystal Rodgers and Emily Dominick will cover the basics of managing and preserving your organization's records. Topics include what types of materials you should save, how and where to store your records, and preservation of your organization's digital files. They will also talk about what supplies will help you get started.

Collecting and Preserving Photos, Films, and Audio/Visual Collections

Nicolette Bromberg and Susan Fitch give tips and best practices for the care and storage of historical photographs, photo albums and films. They will also talk about organizing your digital photos.

Sharing History through Oral History Collections, Exhibits, and Special Projects

Conor Casey, Zhijia Shen, and Juan Luo will guide you through the steps of conducting an oral history interview and designing projects around oral histories, including interviewing tips, sample permission forms, and what kinds of digital files to use. They will share links to many exciting projects that are available online.

Uncovering Ethnic and Family History Resources in the Region

Jessica Albano and Theresa Mudrock invite you to discover resources that local libraries, historic organizations and museums hold that can give context and perspectives on your community's history. Find out what local newspapers, photograph collections, census records, and even academic sources can bring to your history.

Family or Personal Papers and Book Collections

John Bolcer will teach the basics of how to care for your personal or family's historical papers, digital files, and book collections. Topics covered will include deciding what is important to save, what is involved in care and storage, tips on managing digital files for the long term, and options for what to do with collections that you don't want to keep but may be of interest to others.
