The idea of the Museum began in November 2009. The emphasis is on those items or stories that preserve and share the experience of Greeks in Washington State. Information is gathered by meeting with individuals and families to explain the purpose of the Greek-American Historical Museum, conduct interviews and identify possible items for the Collection. Such items may include oral and video histories, articles of clothing, textiles, photographs, written documents, publications or other artifacts.

The Greek-American Historical Museum is designed to tell the stories on line, in a "museum without walls." The Internet provides a means of making the history available to more people than could be reached in any other manner. The Board of the Greek-American Historical Museum of Washington State is grateful to the following for their expert contributions toward creating the "museum without walls": Ted Maroutsos, web administrator; Stephanie Tschida, logo design; Rusyniak Designs, site design. Eventually, a physical site may be used to display the items in the Collection.

Museum is a non-profit corporation registered in the State of Washington and is exempt from taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. It is governed by officers and a Board of Directors. A larger group meets regularly to help plan the activities of the Museum. Donations to the Greek-American Historical Museum may be tax deductible under the Internal Revenue Code. MISSION: To establish an organized means of collecting, preserving and making available the history and culture of the Greek-American community in Washington State.

### **Washing State Area Histories**

The Greeks in Washington Collection counts among its holdings city and regional histories authored by dedicated members of Greek communities in Washington. Some of these publications also contain excellent summaries of both national and northwest trends.

Orthodox respective Greek churches. Thus, photos of Greek Orthodox weddings may appear along with those of social events such as picnics and fraternal activities. The Orthodox sacraments and traditions provided the early Greeks with a sense of security in their new homeland. Once the Greeks established their homes and their means of income, the Church played an increasingly important role in their lives.

The hard work of the early settlers and of those who have documented their history is invaluable. These publications plus a growing number of personal and family histories are archived in the Collection and are available for public view and research.

### *Riverside Remembers II.* Greater Riverside Organization. Everett, Washington: 1986. (212 pages)

This is a compilation of the memories of 50 contributors about Everett and its environs, especially the east Everett neighborhood of Riverside. One of the pieces, "The Greek Community in Everett," (pages 100-105) was written by Panos C. Koutlas, a longtime Everett resident, who captures Greek life in Everett beginning in the early 20th century when there were up to 3,000 Greeks living in the Greater Everett area. The story outlines the integration of these

Greek Everettites into the business community of the city.

### Hellenic Heritage, History of Greek Immigrants in the Yakima Valley through 1950. Adeline, A. R., Adeline, Katherina and Rumpakis, Cleo Adeline. Yakima, Washington: 2002 (221 pages)

This book covers the history of the Greeks of Benton, Kittitas and Yakima counties from 1887 to 1950. Emphasis is placed on family

histories. Professions and busisocial life. AHEPA nesses. (American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association), and World War II participation are featured. The last 100 pages of the book include statistics on railroad workers, census information, restaurateurs, non-Greek spouses, and a Greek file index with vital statistics of the families. Information was gathered from a variety of sources.

### Greek Americans of Bellingham and their Christian Friends, A Pictorial History. Margaritis, Stephen. Bellingham, Washington: 1993. (131 pages)

Prefaced by a substantive section on immigration in general (The Immigrant Story, pages 6-20), this book covers the history of Bellingham Greek American families from the early 20th century to 1990. The families are presented in two sections: before and after

World War II. The book has a rich collection of photos and includes a bibliography.

Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church: From the Beginning . . . An Informal History of our Parish. Damascus, Mary. Spokane, Washington: 1997. (58 pages)

Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Spokane was founded informally in the late 1920s by a few families who would bring Ortho-

dox priests from neighboring cities to conduct occasional liturgies and sacraments. This book covers the history of that parish up to 1997. Along with the church history, the publication highlights all of the organizations that helped to provide a sense of community for these Greek immigrants—the Hellenic Club, AHEPA and its auxiliaries, Greek school and Greek War Relief, to name a few. The history details the evo-

lution of the church as well as the community that built it.

### *The Assumption Church in History 1939-1979.* Fortieth Anniversary Committee. Ed. Joann G. Nicon. Seattle, Washington: 1979. (44 pages)

Published to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Greek Orthodox Church of the Assumption in Seattle, this publication covers the establishment of the parish and the perceived need of the immigrants that founded it. The book is divided into three sections: the beginning, the development, and the present as future. In addition to worship, many aspects of the community within the church are covered.

### A 75 Year Journey Through Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church, 1925-2000. The Saint Nicholas 75th Anniversary Book Committee. Ed. Sophronia Tomaras. Tacoma, Washington: 2000. (175 pages)

This book covering the history of Saint Nicholas Church in Tacoma is divided into two sections: Part 1 covers 1925-1975 and Part 2 covers 1975-2000. In addition to the religious aspects of the church, all of the community-building activities are covered—coffee houses. organizations, language and Sunday schools, dance groups, GOYA (Greek Orthodox Youth of America), scouting, AHEPA and its auxiliaries, Greek Festival. The book also contains a speech entitled "The Greeks in the Pacific Northwest" by Father E. Anthony Tomaras originally delivered to the Pacific Northwest History Conference at the University of Puget Sound, Tacoma, in April of 1963.

### A History of Saint Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church and Her People 1882-1999. St. Demetrios Greek Orthodox Church. Editorial Board. Seattle, Washington: Academy Press, 2005. (440 pages)

This complete history of St. Demetrios Church in Seattle was published in 2005 in commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the parish (1921-1996). In addition to the chapter entitled "History of St. Demetrios Church," a multitude of other aspects of church life are covered: life in the evolving community, education, worship and Divine Liturgy, culture and ethnic organizations among others. The book also includes vital statistics and a bibliography.

2 ½ Tbls. Chinese fish sauce

1 Bundle medium Chinese vermicelli Boiling water

½ lb. cooked sirloin (or beef tenderloin or chuck), thinly sliced

3 Scallions, chopped

Fresh cilantro sprigs, Pepper, Fresh chiles, sliced

Boil beef (with bones) or oxtails in 3 qts cold water. Skim off foam and fat. Cover and simmer for 4 hours. Broil onion until flesh is soft, turning often. Peel. Add onion, ginger, anise, salt, and fish sauce to beef broth just before it has finished simmering. Also just before beef broth finishes simmering, drop vermicelli into a pot of boiling water. Cook 8 minutes, remove from water, rinse in cold water, and drain. Divide vermicelli into three equal portions and place in 3 individual serving bowls. Divide beef into 3 equal portions and place on top of vermicelli in the bowls. Garnish each bowl with scallions and 2 or 3 fresh cilantro sprigs. Strain broth, reserving beef and flavorings. Pour one cup broth over contents of each bowl. Sprinkle with pepper and chiles. Serve immediately. Reserved beef, flavorings, and extra broth can be eaten separately.

### VIETNAMESE LEMONGRASS CHICKEN

- 3 Lbs. Frying chicken
- ½ cup Lemongrass, about 4 stalks minced
- 3 Scallion
- 2 Tbls. Peanut oil
- 2 Red chile peppers; chopped
- 2 tsp. Sugar
- ½ cup Chicken stock; fresh or can
- ¼ tsp. Black pepper; freshly ground
- 1 tsp. Salt
- Garnish:

½ cup Dry-roasted peanuts, chopped 2 Tbls. Nuoc Mam (fish sauce) Coriander leaves; chopped

Chop the chicken into small serving pieces, chopping through the bones with a very sharp cleaver. Remove the outer leaves of the lemongrass and finely slice the tender white part at the base of the stalks. Bruise with a mortar and pestle or the handle of a cleaver. Finely slice the scallions, including the green tops.

Mix the chicken with the salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, the lemongrass and scallions and set aside for 30 minutes. Heat a wok and add the oil, and when the oil is hot add the chicken mixture and stir-fry for 3 minutes. Add chile peppers and stir-fry on medium heat for 10 minutes or until chicken no longer looks pink. Season with sugar and pepper and add the chicken stock. Stir for a few minutes.

Garnish with the peanuts, "nuoc mam" and coriander. Serve with rice, if desired.

### NUOC LEO (VIETNAMESE PEANUT SAUCE)

- 1 Clove garlic, sliced
- 1 Tbls. Vegetable oil
- 1 small Piece of pork liver minced (size
- of a large chicken liver)
- 1 Tbls. Ground pork
- 1 tsp. Tomato paste
- ¼ cup Tuong (find at Vietnamese market)
- ½ cup Water
- 1 ½ tsp. Peanut butter
- 1 Tbls. Granulated sugar
- 1 ½ Tbls. Sesame seeds

10 Roasted unsalted peanuts, coarsely Thin strips of hot pepper for garnish

Using medium heat, fry the garlic in the oil. Add the liver and pork. Lower the heat and add the tomato paste; stir and add the tuong. Stir again and add the water and peanut butter. Raise the heat to medium and add the sugar. Boil for 1 minute and transfer to a bowl. Add the sesame seeds to a medium-hot frying pan, stirring constantly until browned. This should take 2 to 3 minutes. nuoc leo, along with the chopped peanuts. The sauce can be garnished with thin strips of hot pepper. Note: Beef or chicken liver can be substituted, but pork liver is preferred.

### **GREEK MOUSSAKA**

1 Tbls. Butter 1 cup Finely chopped onion 2 lbs. Lean ground beef or lamb 1 ½ lbs. Tomatoes -- peeled & sliced ¼ cup Chopped parsley 6 oz. Tomato paste Salt & pepper Vegetable oil Flour 2 large Eggplants, peeled, sliced 2 each Potatoes, peeled, sliced 1 cup Butter 1 cup Flour 4 cups Milk, hot 4 eggs slightly beaten 1 cup Grated Mizithra or Parmesan

### 1 dash Nutmeg Salt & pepper

Melt 1 tablespoon butter in large skillet. Sauté onion until soft. Add beef ½ pound at a time and cook in batches until brown. Add tomatoes, parsley and tomato paste. Cook 10 to 15 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Set aside. Heat oil in large frying pan. Flour eggplant lightly. Saute' eggplant on both sides in hot oil until golden. Fry potatoes in same skillet, using additional oil if necessary. Set aside. Melt 1 cup butter in medium saucepan. Add 1 cup flour slowly, stirring to form smooth paste. Gradually add hot milk, stirring over low heat until thick and smooth. Mix in eggs and cheese; cook 1 minute. Season with nutmeg, salt and pepper to taste. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a 2-quart baking dish, arrange in alternating layers: potatoes, ½ meat sauce, ½ eggplant, ½ meat sauce, remaining eggplant. Pour cheese sauce over top. Bake until golden, about 50 to 60 minutes.

### **KOULOURAKIA (GREEK SESAME** COOKIES)

- 1 cup Butter
- 1 cup Caster sugar
- 1 tsp. Vanilla essence
- 3 each Eggs
- 5 cups Plain flour
- 3 tsp. Baking powder
- ½ tsp. Ground cinnamon
- ¼ tsp. Ground cloves
- ¼ cup Milk
- ½ cup Toasted sesame seeds

Makes: 70 Cooking time: 15-20 min-Add the sesame seeds to the utes Oven temperature: 190 C (375 F) Cream butter and sugar with vanilla essence until light and fluffy. Beat eggs, reserve 1 tablespoon for glazing and add remainder gradually to butter mixture, beating well. Sift dry ingredients twice. Stir into creamed mixture alternately with milk to form a soft dough. Knead lightly until smooth. If dough is sticky, chill for 1 hour. Scatter some sesame seeds lightly on one side of pastry board. Shape pieces of dough into thick pencil shapes and roll onto the sesame seeds to coat lightly or according to taste. Double over rolled dough and twist, or form into rings, figure eights or coils. Place on greased baking sheets and glaze with reserved egg beaten with a little milk. Bake in a moderate oven for 15-20 minutes until golden brown. Cool on a wire rack and store in an airtight container. Variation: Roll dough in granulated sugar instead of seeds.
