of Liberty Award is given annually to a naturalized citizen who has made outstanding contributions to the United States while maintaining his/ her ethnic heritage.

## Spirit of Liberty Award – July 4, 2012 - Simon Khin.

Simon Khin's native land of Burma is comprised of 135 ethnic groups. Washington State is now home to seven refugee tribes from Burma, our fastest growing ethnic community.

Simon's family of the Karen tribe immigrated to the U.S. in 1977. The day after arriving in Seattle, the 15 -year-old Simon enrolled in Cleveland High School. He remembers his first day, watching lips and hearing voices without comprehending a word.

The Ethnic Heritage Council's Spirit He served in the United States Army and received a degree in architecture from the University of Washington and Electrical Engineering from Seattle Pacific University. He became an engineer at Microsoft, Hewlett-Packard, and Boeing.

> Because of the political turmoil of his native country under a military dictatorship, Simon has always worked to assist the persecuted and voiceless. He and his wife Pwint Htun worked at Burmese refugee camps on the Thai-Burma border.

> In 2006 refugees from Burma began to settle in the U.S. and Simon and Pwint assisted them with language and job skills. To create community empowerment

#### ... did you know?

It is said that the seven spikes in the crown of the Statue of Liberty represent either the seven seas (Arctic, Antarctic, North and South Atlantic, North and South Pacific, Indian) or the seven continents (North and South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Antarctica, Australia). The twentyfive windows in the crown represent the "natural minerals" of the earth. The toga represents the Ancient Republic of Rome, the torch represents enlightenment, and the chains underfoot represent Liberty (freedom) crushing the chains of slavery.

Simon works with refugee youth to create future leaders. Last year he organized a free summer camp in English, Math, Drama, Physical Education and Computers for refugee students.

Paying for funeral expenses, tutoring high school students, opening his home to refugees are only some of Simon's acts of tireless commitment that have benefitted our most vulnerable communities.

The Naturalization Test is among the many requirements one must accomplish in order to become a naturalized citizen. The test is one of the final steps before taking the oath to become a naturalized citizen of the United States of America!

## Pathway to Citizenship & The New Redesigned Test

In the interest of creating a more standardized, fair, and meaningful naturalization process, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) redesigned the naturalization test. The redesigned test, with an emphasis on the fundamental concepts of American democracy and the rights and responsibilities of citizenship, will help encourage citizenship applicants to learn and identify with the basic values we all share as Americans, ensuring applicants have uniform, consistent testing experiences nationwide.

USCIS began administering a redesigned (new) naturalization test October 1, 2008. For more information visit: www.uscis.gov/newtest

## SAMPLE Civics Questions for the Naturalization Test

Ruže Dalmatinke, from Seattle, Washington. Deep passion and intense devotion to Croatian musical heritage have kept the group active since 1981, and have inspired the group's lead vocalists, sisters Binki and Alma, since Ljubica (Binki) Franulović childhood. Spahi (lead voice) and Alma Franulović Plancich (second voice) lead Ruže Dalmatinke in singing, and are responsible for the group's adherence to traditional purity in their music.

From the town of Vela Luka on the island of Korčula, Dalmatia, Croatia, they immigrated with their family to the United States after World War II. Having sung together since childhood, the sisters brought with them their lifestyle of singing, as well as an oral tradition generations old. Their voices are accompanied by instrumentation, adding to the vocal harmonies. The band members, also vocalists, along with Binki and Alma, perform music from the many different regions of Croatia from the tranquil Dalmatian ballads to the strident melodies of the interior.

The Statue of Liberty was dedicated on October 28, 1886, designated as a National Monument in 1924 and restored for her centennial on July 4, 1986.

The Statue was a joint effort between America and France and it was agreed upon that the American people were to build the pedestal, and the French people were responsible for the Statue and its assembly here in the United States. The French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi intended to have the statue complete in commemoration of the American
